1939 TRAVEL SUMMARY - FAR 10-3-39 TRAVEL SUMMARY - FAR 1

While there was a substantial travel decrease during the 1939 season, ending September 50, Rocky Mountain National Park, Colorado, again holds the attendance record for national parks west of the Mississippi River with a total of 609,029 visitors arriving in 185,356 automobiles.

Travel information, released today by Park Superintendent David H. Canfield, reveals that every state in the union, five United States territories and possessions and 15 foreign countries were represented by visitors. Indicative of the wide national appeal of the park, over 50 per cent of the travel came from states other than Colorado, with the middlewest particularly well represented.

attendance dropped by 50,79% people. The bulk of the loss was represented by a decrease of 39,16% Colorado visitors. This is in part attributed to the poor condition of approach roads in the immediate vicinity of the park and to a local misunderstanding of park entrance fees placed in effect for the first time this year along with charges authorized for numerous other National Park Service areas throughout the country.

to use roads within the national park, took effect in June as a measure to make the park more self-supporting. Unfamiliarity with details of the new regulation may have deterred visits but undoubtedly normal travel will be resumed next year to bring Colorado travel back to its former status. It was a general impression that a dollar charge was made for each entry to the park, contrary to the fact that purchase of an entrance permit embled the individual automobile to enter the pack for the calendar year without further cost.

A decrease in out of state travel is indirectly connected with travel competition between world's Fairs and Expositions held in New York City and San Francisco, acting as travel lures which encouraged hurried driving to cover maximum mileage in minimum time. This is said to have precluded visits to scenic areas near main routes of travel between the two attractions, especially in the interior of the country.

A growing public interest in services offered by the park naturalists is reflected by a 20 per cent gain in contacts made at museums, lectures and field trips for an increase of 23,548 people in the face of a park attendance loss. Of the total 137,348 contacts from June 1 to September 30, the Fall River Pass museum took the lead with 78,007, followed by museums at Park Headquarters and Moraine Park. A number of guided field trips were introduced during the season, including camera caravans for amateur camera fans.

A junior nature school for youngsters was a summer feature for the second year. Weekly sessions were broadcast over 47 stations of the National Broadcasting Company red network for 12 weeks, reaching many thousands of listeners in middlewestern and eastern states.

by entrances, the Thompson River checking station tallied the largest total or 80377 cars and 260435 visitors. The Fall River Entrance was second with 47,896 cars and 165,905 people, followed by Grand Luke with 44,511 cars and 143,035 people. Other entrances, such as Wild Basin and Longs Peak campground, not equipped with regular checking stations, tallied 10,572 autos and 39,604 visitors.

First entry cars for the travel year have a total of 85,412 and 292,973 people. Reentries or repeaters are recorded at 39,944 cars and 316,056 visitors. August was the greatest travel month with 212,777 people and 61,152 automobiles or 16,233 less visitors than the same month in 1938. During the period from October 1 to May 31, featured by snow sports, 75,636 people arrived.

Outside of Colorado, Illinois led the parade of visitors with a total of 52,690, followed by Nebraska, 44,129; Kansas, 38,880; Missouri, 29,813; and by Iowa, Texas, Oklahoma and California in the large total class. As in 1938, the smallest number came from Vermont with 53 persons, a gain of 16 over last year.

Popularity of the famed Trail Ridge Road is revealed by a traffic check of summer travel showing the passage of 80,500 automobiles and 310,000 people over the highway above the clouds. Of this number 43,771 cars were checked as they left park by way of the Grand Lake ranger station. By actual count they carried 159,865 people. The remaining total, closely estimated, entered by way of Grand Lake and made their exit via Fall River and Thompson River entrance stations.

While naturalist services, hotels and other accommodations are no longer available within park boundaries, Rocky mountain National Pork will be open to travel throughout the year, with the exception of the high altitude Trail Ridge Road over the Continental Divide, which is usually blocked by snow in October or November. However, snow plows will be in operation to keep this route open to the upper end of Hidden Valley on the eastern slopes of the park and also for a limited distance on the western slopes.

Preparations are now under way for another heavily attended winter sports season. The fall and winter months also attract nature lovers since deep snows drive great herds of elk and deer to lower altitudes, resulting in rare displays of wildlife.
