Here again is a scenic Monument with the outstanding features in the field of geology.

In order to present the geological story to visitors, however, it will be necessary to include the entire surrounding region. Nest of the geological occurrences that were responsible for the sand dunes took place outside the Nonument and the entire San Luis Valley as well as the high bordering mountain ranges will need to be brought into the picture.

Although the geological story is dominant in this Monument, two other angles may deserve consideration; history and archaeology. The San Luis Valley has an interesting historical background that is worthy of a minor treatment. In the field of archaeology nothing of especial importance has as yet been found but there is a possibility that evidences of the Folsom complex may come to light. If this should develop, a minor treatment of these ancient Indians and the recent Utes, of whom there are many indications, would be called for-

A small museum seems to be essential in the interpretive program for this Monument. One large room with a large observation porch over-looking the dunes would suffice. By means of wall cases, and relief models in the main room, and pointers and pictures set in the parapet wall of the porch the geological story could be presented.

If the museum development should be slow in coming, an immediate trailside treatment should be considered. A trailside structure, such as those suggested for the other menuments, would permit an adequate interpretive treatment until the museum develops.

The sand dunes are so unusual that they certainly mustaments the curiosity of the average visitor and a simple presentation, such as would be possible in a trailaids exhibit, should be of interest to them.
